

It's a stark fact. By the time you finish reading this page, one child somewhere in the world will have gone blind. One goes blind every minute. Half-a-million will have lost

their sight by the end of the year.

Childhood blindness is only one part of the global vision crisis. If nothing is done, experts say that the world's blind population could double from 37 million to 74 million by 2020.

Why the World Needs CSFII

SightFirst has been extraordinarily effective but Lions' "Vision for All" has not been realised. The growth and ageing of the world's population pose new challenges. Changing patterns of eye disease, barely discernable when SightFirst began, have become serious threats to sight all across the world.

Cataract, a disease closely tied to ageing, remains the world's leading cause of blindness.

Today, more children than ever before suffer from blindness or low vision. River blindness and trachoma, which take the sight of millions, can be controlled, but increased global awareness and funding are required.

Diabetes and glaucoma silently stalk the vision of millions who may not even know that they are at risk.

The SightFirst approach is a three-part strategy to halt and roll-back this onslaught. The goals of Campaign SightFirst II reflect this plan.

Goal 1 - US\$100 million To contain and eliminate where possible the leading causes of avoidable blindness.

Goal 2 - US\$50 million To combat emerging threats to sight.

Goal 3 - US\$50 million As a "challenge goal" to provide "Vision for All" through research, rehabilitation and reaching-out to vulnerable populations.

It seems to me that every fiscal year is a game of two halves. Your response to significant administrative changes was very encouraging in the first half and now is the time to build on that good foundation by addressing some important challenges in the second half, so please: -

"CONNECT" WITH THE CHALLENGE TO CHANGE.... to Electronic Reporting.

Thank you for an increasingly impressive response here. We are closing in on 100% with only

4 Clubs yet to reap the benefit of submitting Membership Reports electronically. It is easier, quicker and more efficient and cost effective for everyone, with the ability to input data instantly rather than taking weeks to process by paper from Club to LCIHQ.

"CONNECT" WITH THE CHALLENGE TO CHANGE.... the Trends of Membership.

Again, thanks to the Clubs' response and the support of the MERL Team, the downward trend has at last been reversed. As at half-year end, our District Membership Database recorded: –

1060 Members: a net gain of 11 since June after 41 New and 31 Drops.

This includes the emergence of Birmingham Northfield Club from Status Quo with 10 New

Members inducted in December. Great news indeed, so let's keep maintaining the upward trend.

"CONNECT" WITH THE CHALLENGE TO CHANGE.... the PU101 Reporting of Club Officers.

Early Spring will see the Elections of Club Officers taking place and the reporting of their details promptly is imperative to achieve efficient and powerful inter communication.

The process of electronic submission of PU101 Forms is covered in my Guide Notes on the District Website. Just click on Resources, then Guides and Manuals to find out more.

<u>Please note in particular</u> that it is vital to include email addresses on PU101s to ensure receipt of Clubs' new Passwords for 2008-9 because, whether there are changes of Officers or not, the current Passwords will cease to function by 31 July 2008.

Please note also the good news from MDHQ in the Dec/Jan LION Magazine on Page 19: - (Quote) "We are now working closely with International HQ to cut down on the administration that our hardworking Club Secretaries have to do, and we hope very shortly to be able to announce that you will only have to input information via PU101s or eMMR once to us at MDHQ and we will communicate that on your behalf on to International HQ."

APRIL IN KETTERING

Kettering & District Lions Club are again organising their special 15th. annual

DAY IN THE PARK

at the famous Wicksteed Park on $\underline{26^{th}}$. April 2008, and all Lions clubs are invited to join us in providing a fabulous day out for disabled, handicapped and underprivileged children and families. We will act as hosts, and will be available to assist with any problems that arise, but each club must be responsible for the children that they bring.

Wicksteed Park, opened in 1913 and was the first leisure park in the country, is set in

147 acres of parkland, lakes and nature trails, and is unique in still offering free admission. It has kept well up to date with the addition of a huge variety of rides and attractions, including traditional swings and slides, a 7 metre high Astraglide, Pirate Ship Swing Boat, Dodgems, Drop Tower and a Laser Dome. The famous Water Chute and Miniature Railway, from the early days, (but now modernised to meet current safety standards), along with Paddle boats, Monorail, Veteran Car Ride etc, offer a fun filled and exciting day for young people.

Kettering Lions club have negotiated free car and coach parking, and a very generously discounted price of just £10 for the wrist bands that give unlimited free access to rides and attractions, subject to a minimum height requirement of 1 metre on most rides. This varies slightly depending on the safety rules, and can require an adult to

accompany the child. Wicksteed has made a big effort to ensure that the majority of rides can be accessed by people with disabilities, but usually requires that an adult accompanies them. Wheelchairs are available free, but you must book them well in advance, direct with the park, with a £5 deposit.

Food and drink is widely available at the park, varying from fast food such as hot dogs burgers & chips etc. to children's set meals in the restaurant, but this can add considerably to the cost of the day. Experience from previous years has been that clubs have provided a picnic, or tell the children to bring a packed meal with them.
